The Duke of York's Regiment of Horse (6 troops in 2 squadrons)  
The Duke of Monmouth's Regiment of Horse (6 troops in 2 squadrons)  
The Earl of Feversham's Regiment of Dragoons (6? troops in 3 squadrons)  
    (Note: A squadron of horse should have numbered 180 men and a  
          squadron of dragoons 160 men)

The First Royal Regiment of Foot Guards\*  
    commanded by Lord Howard of Estrick  
The Second or Coldstream Regiment of Foot Guards\*  
The Duke of York & Albany's Regiment of Foot\*  
    commanded by Sir Charles Littleton  
The Holland Regiment of Foot\*  
    (Note: Each of the four 'regular' regiments of foot sent only 8  
          companies of the establishments. These 8 companies, of 100 men  
          each, were formed as "battalions")  
The Duke of Monmouth's Regiment of Foot  
    1st Bn commanded by Lt Colonel Justin Macartie  
    2nd Bn commanded by Lt Colonel Roger Langley  
The Duchess of York & Albany's Regiment of Foot\*?  
    commanded by Colonel Edward Villiers  
Sir Charles Wheeler's Regiment of Foot  
Lord Allington's Regiment of Foot\*  
Colonel George Legge's Regiment of Foot  
Sir John Fenwick's Regiment of Foot  
Sir Lionel Walden's Regiment of Foot  
Lord O'Brien's Regiment of Foot  
Colonel Henry Sidney's Regiment of Foot\*  
Sir Henry Goodricke's Regiment of Foot  
Sir Thomas Slingsby's Regiment of Foot\*  
    (Note: Each regiment or Battalion was composed of 8 companies of  
          100 men each)

\* These Regiments accompanied Monmouth to Brussels in August - the remainder  
stayed in garrison at Ostend, Bruges and Nieuport under the command of Sir  
Charles Littleton)
