Formed with the Pannwitz Reiterverband as its staff and the Platow Cossack Cavalry Regiment and the von Jungschulz Cossack Cavalry Regiment.

2nd Cossack Cavalry Division: formed November 1944 from the 2nd Cossack Cavalry Brigade. It contained the:

In September 1944 it was reorganized as follows:

The 177th Sturmgeschütz Battalion became a brigade on 6/10 and on 8/9/44 became the 69th Panzer Jäger Battalion.

<u>3rd</u> <u>Cavalry Division</u>: Formed in February 1945 from the 3rd Cavalry Brigade. It was captured by Graz in May 1945 by the Americans.

 $\underline{4th}$ Cavalry Brigade: Formed on 5/29/44 by Army Group Middle as the Süd und Nord Cavalry Regiment. It had:

A second artillery battalion was formed in 1945, creating an artillery regiment entitled 70th Cavalry Granatwerfer (Mortar) Regiment. A third battalion was later formed. The 189th Sturmgeschütz Battalion was assigned to the brigade as the 70th Panzerjäger Battalion.

4th Cavalry Division: Formed in February 1945 from the 4th Cavalry Brigade. In May 1945 it went into English captivity.

Nord Cavalry Regiment: Formed on 6/1/43 by Army Group North from the cavalry squadrons of the 32nd and 132nd Infantry Divisions and the cavalry of the other reconnaissance and bicycle units assigned as army troops. On 11/23/43 it formed a 9th company from the 1st Co., 112nd Infantry Regiment. It was restructured on 4/23/44 and an artillery battalion (2 btrys), two trench mortar squadrons, and a flak squadron were formed. In the summer of 1944 it

became the 5th Reiter Regiment.

Norwegian Bicycle Reconnaissance Brigade: Formed in April 1944 as the Norwegian Bicycle Reconnaissance Regiment. It had two battalions, each with four companies. The battalions were formed as follows: 1st from the 95th Reconnaissance Battalion, 3rd Mountain Division, the 2nd from the 233rd Reconnaissance Battalion, 196th Division. In July 1944 it was renamed the Norwegian Bicycle Reconnaissance Brigade. In November 1944 it was assigned to the 20th Mountain Corps. In February 1945 it was broken up. The 1st and 2nd Battalions, each with five squadrons, were redesignated the 11th Sturm Squadron and the 12th Gun Squadron.
