In 1944 the 5th (Lehr) Regiment was organized with the 1/,2/Lehr Regiment Brandenburg and Kurfürst Lehr Regiment. During the occupation of Hungary in March 1944 the Brandenburg Alarm Regiment was formed. The division was transferred to the regular armed forces, with many of the men going to the SS. The remainder was organized into the Brandenburg Panzer Grenadier Division on 9/15/44. The 4th Regiment was absorbed by the 1st and 2nd Regiment, while the 3rd Regiment went to Italy where it became the Generalfeldmarschall Kesselring Machine Gun Battalion.

"B" Division: Formed on 6/19/43 as a garrison division. On 7/7/43 it became the 243rd Infantry Division.

Bayern Training Division: Formed in April 1945 and had:

Bialystok Division: Formed on 8/1/41 in Bialystok as Division Commando z.b.V. Bialystok and was used to form the 461st Division on 9/24/42.

Böhmen Infantry Division: Formed on 4/17/44 as a shadow division of the 26th wave, it was sent to southern France for the reorganization of the 198th Infantry Division.

Breslau Infantry Division: Formed on 8/3/44 as a shadow division of the 31st Wave. It was disbanded on 8/28/44 and its troops used to rebuild the 357th Infantry Division.

von Broich Division: Formed on 11/15/42 in Africa from the Ortskommandantur 2/960 (Town Garrison Headquarters). It was also known as the von Broich Schützen Brigade. On 30 January 1943 it contained:

Danzig Fortress Division: Formed in January 1945. On 1/31/45 it absorbed the Freytag Kampfgruppe (4 battalions & 2 Alarm Battalions). It fell to the Russians on 28 March.

Deneke Division: Formed on 1/23/45 and served on the Vistula and in Pommernia.

"E" Division: Formed on 6/19/43 as a static division using convalescents of the 340th Infantry Division (Static). In February 1943 it became the 340th Infantry Division. Later, on 7/7/43, it became the 244th Infantry Division.

Freiwilliger (Volunteer) Stamm Division: Formed in southern France on 2/1/44 with ethnic Slavs and Turks. The division had:

- 2nd Freiwilliger Stamm Regiment (Armenians and Azerbizanians)
- 3rd Freiwilliger Stamm Regiment (Russians and Ukrainians)

Führer Grenadier Brigade: Formed in July 1944 from the reinforced Führer Grenadier Battalion with:

- 4th Battalion - 13-16th Companies -newly formed.

The division was taken prisoner by the Americans and handed over to the Russians.

Friedrich Ludwig Jahn (2nd RAD) Division: Formed on 3/31/45 from the 251st Infantry Division and 7,500 RAD (Reichsarbeitsdienst) men organized as a Type 45 Division. It was part of the 35th Wave and had :

The division was definitely lost when Stalingrad was recaptured by the Russians, however, the history of the division prior to that event is not known.

It was also designated as the GIF (Generalinspekteur f.d. Führernachwuchs) Division. The 5/412th Volks Artillery Corps was attached to form the U.v.H. Artillery Regiment. The fate of the division is uncertain, but with the capture of Warsaw by the Russians, it, no doubt, was destroyed by them and its remains captured or fled back into Germany. However, it was officially disbanded on 2/27/45.
