Strength: 16,066 officers, NCOs & men. 14,524 rifles, 413 SMGs, 342 LMGs, 163 HGMs, 165 mortars, 18 AT rifles, 39 AT guns, 15 Flak guns, 24 light field uguns, 12 light field howitzers.
